• We want to help you mitigate your property for wildfires this fall - Douglas County Wildfire Mitigation Cost-Share program offers homeowners 50% financial match toward qualified mitigation efforts

Recent wildfires across Colorado are a reminder that fast-moving wildfires can hit anywhere at any time. Wildfires are the No. 1 natural hazard in Douglas County, which means living in the peace and tranquility of our beautiful natural areas comes with the personal responsibility to mitigate for wildfires. Now is the time to protect your home, property, and neighborhood – we can help. (full story)



Following a successful launch in 2023, Douglas County is bringing back its <u>Wildfire Mitigation Cost-Share program</u>, which will provide a 50% financial match to homeowners up to \$5,000 to help create defensible space, reduce hazards and increase community safety and resilience to wildfires. Additionally, the County will contribute up to \$25,000 for community projects and encourage adjacent residents to apply together.

The current application period is open from Aug. 12 to Sept. 2, 2024. Projects will be awarded through a competitive application process. Due to limited funding, all projects may not receive funding. Applicants will be contacted via email if their application is selected. Please remember that incomplete applications will not be accepted or reviewed. Before you begin the application, check to make sure you have all of the required documents. Office of Emergency Management

• The Douglas County Helitack Team has been very busy responding to wildfires in Clear Creek, Larimer, and Jefferson counties over the last two weeks. Since the previous report, our helicopter has flown 44 hours and dropped 116,000 gallons of water to support wildfire suppression on the Front Range.











- Preparations continue in support of the upcoming BMW Classic golf tournament in Castle Pines.

- The Douglas County IMT held a quarterly meeting/training in preparation for the fall exercise.




Community Services

• HEART Activity Report - June 2024









- **HEART Success Story**: Staff received a call at the beginning of June from a family of five that relocated to Colorado from Virginia. While waiting for their apartment to become available, they ran out of funds to stay in a hotel. They found themselves homeless and living out of their vehicle. The family applied for multiple county programs and contacted numerous churches for assistance. A seven-night hotel stay was secured for the family and a local church helped fund their security deposit. The family moved into their apartment on June 18th and are grateful for the assistance.
- Parker Police Department's National Night Out On Sunday, July 28th, the HEART participated in this annual event to enhance the partnership between citizens, businesses, and law enforcement communities. The HEART educated citizens about their outreach efforts and the Douglas County Homeless Initiative.





• Summer Point-In-Time Count - The HEART, Community Services, local law enforcement, AllHealth Network, and other community partners conducted the annual summer Point In Time (PIT) count. The PIT count seeks to provide a snapshot of the unhoused population in Douglas County on a single night. This summer, the survey focused on where unhoused residents spent the night of July 29th. The data collected from the survey helps to track the effectiveness of our current programs and provides more information about the causes of homelessness locally. The winter PIT count will take place in January.



- Older Adult Initiative Roadshows The Older Adult Initiative (OAI) Roadshows continued over this activity period with events in Larkspur, Parker, Franktown, and Sedalia. Community input remains strong with positive responses to the priorities identified by the OAI Executive Committee and the County's efforts to involve older adults in shaping the outcomes of the initiative.
- Youth Congress 2024 Save the Date: On October 7, 2024, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Colorado State Capitol 9-12 graders will meet elected officials and community leaders to ask questions and have a dialogue. Transportation will be offered, plus lunch and snacks. A link to reserve your spot will be open on August 23, 2024 and sent out via email. Youth will receive 6 hours of community service and this is an excused absence. Participants must have parent/guardian permission to attend








Planning Services

- Historic Preservation Updates
 - O Site Stewardship Tour with the Assistant State Archaeologist On July 16th, the DC Curator and County contractor Todd McMahon, and Assistant State Archaeologist Sarah Allaun toured multiple historic and cultural sites in Douglas County. The Douglas County History Repository is partnering with the State to pilot a site stewardship program. The goal of the tour was to show the State potential sites that the County would like to be included in the program and can be used for training volunteers. The State will help train volunteers to monitor County sites and assist in the protection of historic and cultural resources. If the program is successful, the goal is to enable other counties to have a site stewards' program.

The tour began on Lost Canyon, where Town of Castle Rock staff joined in and lead a hike up to Franktown Cave. After Lost Canyon, staff traveled to William Converse Ranch on Hidden Mesa Open Space, Prairie Canyon Ranch, Blackfoot Cave, and Spring Valley School.

In September, the County will partner with the State to offer one weekend of training, including a day lecture and two-day field training. The current potential sites for field training are: William Converse Ranch, Blackfoot Cave, and Columbine Open Space.







 Schweiger Ranch Discover Archaeology Day - Douglas County History Repository was invited to join Schweiger Ranch and Interpret Site, LLC for a Discover Archaeology Day at the Schweiger Ranch on Wednesday, July 17th. The Repository set up a booth with multiple tables with artifacts, educational items people could touch, and County virtual museum information. Volunteers from the Repository, Historic Preservation Board members, and a County contractor also helped run the booth and visit with citizens. A total of 34 visitors came to the 2-hour event, including many families with children.

The artifacts highlighted at the event were from the Big Dry Creek Cheese Ranch (5DA.221). This Ranch was located in Highlands Ranch and is from the same time period as Schweiger Ranch. The property was the remains of a dairy and ranch complex and produced cheese from 1880-1938. It was an essential part to early growth of Douglas County. The original area of the Cheese Ranch has been developed with houses, although an area has been dedicated and preserved as the Cheese Ranch Historic and Natural Area. The remaining artifact standing at the site is a historic windmill.







Citizen Inquiry on Collected Artifacts - On July 18th Mac Robinson and his wife brought a box of potential artifacts to the History Repository for identification. All the material was petrified wood, and most were flakes also known as debitage, which is left over pieces from making or sharpening tools. The couple had some projectile points that staff could identify and date, the oldest was 4,000 years old. The artifacts were collected in public areas, in creeks and disturbed area. We also took the opportunity to teach them that removing artifacts takes away the context and most of the information they were seeking from us.





O Historic Preservation at the Douglas County Fair - On Thursday August 1st, the County Curator and Contractor attended the Douglas County Fair. Historic Douglas County had a large booth representing County historical societies, Historic Preservation Board and Repository and staff brought educational artifacts and virtual museum info to the fair.







Parks, Trails and Building Grounds

- Parks Operations Update
 - O Bluffs Restoration Due to historic rainfall in 2023, sections of trail at Bluffs Regional Park experienced severe erosion. Parks staff worked closely with Douglas County Engineering to bring in contractors to restore a heavily impacted section of trail. The contractor re-established grade diversions installed several hundred tons of surface material and added seed and erosion control blanket.





O Irrigation Repairs - One constant task that Parks staff deals with is irrigation repairs. With some systems approaching 30 years of use, failures are a common occurrence. Repairs to these systems can vary from a few minutes to two days. Staff members are well versed in troubleshooting and making repairs as efficiently as possible.









O Douglas County Celebrates Parks and Recreation Month with Staff - On July 25, 2024, Douglas County Parks, Trails, and Building Grounds celebrated staff by serving up a delicious breakfast in the beauty of Highland Heritage Regional Park. Staff were treated to freshly made pancakes, sausage, fruit, and beverages in the early morning before heading out to the many parks and trails they care for and maintain. Commissioners Thomas and Laydon, Jared Taylor (Chair of the Parks Advisory Board) and Karen Hickman (Board Member) joined the Parks staff to celebrate Parks and Recreation Month. Leadership from Douglas County congratulated them on an excellent job caring for our natural resources and making our parks and trails what makes our county stand out as an exceptional place to live and play.

- o Volunteer Program Update: Three volunteer events were hosted in July.
 - A tree planting event on July 13th was attended by 12 volunteers who provided 18 hours of service. They planted eight trees at Pinery Park that will add shade and beauty to the east side of the park.
 - One volunteer provided two hours of service pruning gambel oak along the East/West Regional Trail on July 17th. This work improved sight lines along the trail, increasing the safety for all users.
 - Shoreline Cleanup at Bingham Lake on July 18th was attended by six volunteers who provided 12 hours of service and filled five bags of trash.

• Rueter-Hess Reservoir Update

O Bluegill Stocking - Each year, Parker Water and Sanitation District and the County partner to assess and maintain the fishery at Rueter-Hess Reservoir. The fishery is, first and foremost, a water quality tool. Recreational fishing is a secondary benefit. On Thursday, July 25th Rueter-Hess reservoir was stocked with 13,200 bluegills by Aqua Sierra Fisheries Consultants. These fish will supplement the current bluegill population in the reservoir. This is great news for the anglers at Rueter-Hess because not only are the fish a popular catch on their own, but they also represent an important food supply for the Walleye and Bass.




- O Girl Scouts Camp Rueter-Hess Reservoir welcomed 21 Girl Scouts for a week-long camp starting on July 15th. This marks the fifth year that the reservoir has hosted the event. The camp focused on water recreation safety and training. Throughout the week, the scouts learned to use and navigate paddleboards, kayaks, canoes, sailboards, and sailboats under the guidance of trained instructors. The camp culminated in a pirate-themed fun day that featured activities such as walking the plank across canoes, canoe tug-of-war, and relay races.
- o Lone Tree Visitation Day On July 20th, the City of Lone Tree held its second annual Partner Day at Rueter-Hess Reservoir. Residents participated in paddle sports, fishing, and hiking at the Rueter Hess Reservoir. Rangers welcomed 148 Lone Tree residents and inspected their watercraft. Rangers maintained a presence on the water and educated people about the importance of wearing a lifejacket. In the days leading up to the free day, rangers spent over 9 hours maintaining trail and shoreline access for the coming guests.

Public Works

• West Frontage Road Relocation Project – On July 2, Douglas County Public Works Engineering solicited bids for the West Frontage Relocation project. Seven bids were received and the lowest responsive, responsible bidder was Holcim-WCR so a construction contract will go before the BOCC on August 13th. This project consists of relocating the existing I-25 West Frontage Road from the east side of the BNSF railroad to the west side. This reconstruction is needed to accommodate the proposed Crystal Valley Interchange which requires closing a portion of the existing I-25 West Frontage Road between Tomah Road and Yucca Hills Road to build the proposed southbound I-25 exit and entrance ramps over top of the existing

I-25 West Frontage Road. Reconstruction also requires making improvements to the Tomah Road / Bear Dance Road intersection and its approaches. The Relocated West Frontage Road will provide one through lane in each direction, a 5-foot-wide shoulder, and a 12-foot-wide painted median to provide access to the parcels located on the west side of the railroad tracks. Construction is anticipated to start in early September and be completed in September of 2025.



• Featured Project – Completed: Omega Circle - Acres Green is a subdivision platted in the early to mid1970s with limited storm sewer infrastructure. In June of 2023, Omega Circle experienced several large
storms that caused the street to flood and then spread into the neighboring properties resulting in some
basement flooding. The homeowners in this area have been keeping the inlets clear of leaves and pine needles
for years and have waded out into waist-deep waters to try to clean the inlet from debris that may have washed
downstream during these rainstorms.

Due to the age and limited capacity of the system, Special Projects Engineering contracted with ICON Engineering, Inc. to prepare a drainage study and construction plans for improvements to Omega Circle. The storm sewer in this area is located in Omega Circle, travels the side yard in between two (2) homes, and ties into the storm sewer system of the Lone Tree Town Center development located north of Acres Green. ICON Engineering found that the system could be improved to collect 73% of the 100-year event with 2- 20' Type R Inlets, a new storm sewer pipe between these new inlets, and an overflow path to assist in keeping future large storm events from impacting the homes at this low point. The construction of the project was awarded to Shelbourn Enterprises, LLC in May 2024. Shelbourn Enterprises started work in June 2024 and finished mid-July 2024.





Activities for July 22 – August 9, 2024 *Active Projects*

- US 85 Widening from Highlands Ranch Pkwy to C-470
 - Single lane closures on C-470 at US 85 nightly from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. July 15 through Saturday, July 20.
 - Paving operations and median installations continue project-wide with a focus near Town Center Drive. In the coming weeks, motorists should expect daytime lane closures and extended turn restrictions near the intersection.
 - Bridge construction continues on the new eastern portion of the US 85 bridge over C-470. Crews will work mainly offline with intermittent lane closures on C-470 on- and offramps during off-peak hours. Timeline: Fall 2022 to Fall 2025.

• Pinery Outfall Repair Project - Starting July 17, 2024: The Pinery Outfall Repair Project will clean and expose the outfalls that have been located and inspected in the Pinery Subdivision. There are about 40 outfalls that are in poor condition that need cleaning and then repairs. The work being done at this time involves cleaning and exposing the outfalls only, no repairs at this time. Work will be intermittent as crew availability allows. (See map for all locations)



- Quebec Lincoln University Signal and Intersection Reconstruction Project Crews will continue to work on punch list items and traffic signals. In addition, crews will install permanent lane markings in the intersection. Read more about the project here: Quebec & University/Lincoln Intersection Project
- University Boulevard (between Crossland Way and Crosspointe) Small UV CIPP Storm Sewer Lining Project August 1 6, 2024: The Douglas County Highlands Ranch Small UV CIPP Lining Project is still active.

Summary of project: Our contractor is completing the lining of the storm sewer that goes across the University between Douglas County's Highlands Heritage Regional Park and HRMD's Cheese Ranch Historic Park. A section of pipe in HRMD's Cheese Ranch Historic Park also needs to be excavated and lined. Due to the nature of the maintenance being completed, work hours will extend beyond the normal road closure times.

 Roxborough Park Road CLOSURE (Closure of the Gravel Road portion between Titan Rd and Waterton Rd)

Starting on March 26, 2024, there will be a road closure on Roxborough Park Rd for one year (to re-open on March 26, 2025). This closure is for the placement of fill for the improvements on the graveled portion of Roxborough Park Rd. The closure is on Roxborough Park Rd between Waterton Rd and Titan Rd. Detour routes are posted.





• **Permits and Inspections Graphs** - The total YTD number of new Public Works DESC, GESC, and ROW Permits are up approximately 15% from 2023. Total active permits are up approximately 3% from 2023.

MS4 and Stormwater Matters

Secondary containment for the magnesium chloride tanks at the Northwest Public Works Operations Facility has been installed. The secondary containment was constructed using 28 sections of Muscle Wall and 30 mil RPE liner. This installation helps the County remain compliant with the MS4 Permit for outdoor bulk storage structures.



Operations and Pavement Management

- 2024 Sidewalk Repair and Curb Ramp Retrofit Program During this reporting period, Chato's Concrete started repair of curb, gutter, and sidewalk, and upgrade of curb ramps, in the Northridge subdivision. So far this year, a total of 43,002 linear feet of curb, gutter, and sidewalk have been replaced, 2,181 square yards of concrete pavement, 201 ADA ramps, and 34 chase drains.
- **Asphalt Overlay Project:** During this reporting period Brennen Gravel and Sand paved 37,494 tons of asphalt.
- Culvert Inspections: During this period, inspections were completed at nine locations. To date, 534 inspections have been completed to date. Outcomes are as follows:
 - o Good 292
 - \circ Fair -102
 - o Poor 97
 - o Severe 43

Inspections are scheduled for Trout Creek subdivision and N. Rainbow Falls Rd.

- Ditch and Culvert Maintenance: During this reporting period areas were maintained: 9J Rd, Crowfoot Valley Rd, Hidden Valley Rd, Jackson Creek Rd, Lariat Dr, N. Commerce Ct, Peterson Rd, Pine Creek Rd and Timber Ln.
- **Gravel Road Program:** The County maintains a network of approximately 300 miles of gravel roads. The following outlines the project information from each program.

- Sweeping Program: Sweeping operations removes particulate matter and improves air quality to meet metro area quality standards. Regular sweeping removes sand, debris, leaves, and trash that can cause unsafe conditions for motorists, bicyclist, and pedestrians. And protects and improves water quality before it can enter storm sewers and drainage ways. During this reporting period, sweeping was completed on 29 roadways. A total of 1,108 yards of debris YTD were swept and removed from residential and arterial roads.
- **Invasive Weeds Spraying** During this reporting period, invasive weeds were treated on a total of 60 acres in Douglas County Open Space areas.
- **Surveying** Survey data was collected to assist in determining drainage concerns along North Rampart Range Road located in Chatfield Farms H.O.A. (Roxborough Village). Survey included exposing a handful of storm sewer appurtenances and creating an existing surface for analysis.

Survey work is complete on Ponderosa Drive where a future turn lane for Pine Lane Primary Elementary School will be contemplated.

• We are pleased to announce **Zeke Lynch has been selected for Asst. Director Public Works Engineering** effective July 11, 2024. Zeke previously served as our Traffic Engineering / Traffic Operations Manager and has been an employee since June 2020. In his new role, Zeke will work closely with Director Janet Herman in the direction of our multidivisional engineering organization, which entails planning, design, and construction of engineering projects. Zeke will have direct supervision over the Development Review Team, the Stormwater Management Team as well as the Traffic Eng/Ops Team and will have further direction over the Capital Improvements Team, Special Projects Team, as well as the Administration Team for Engineering.

- School is back in session! Prior to the start of school, our Signal Technicians completed their annual preventative maintenance on our School Flashers that operate at the twenty-eight schools within the County that have a reduced school zone. The County's investment made in 2021 to upgrade school flashers Countywide with state-of-the-art hardware that is accessible via cellular communications has been instrumental. The new system allows remote schedule programming and monitoring, saving staff time and enhancing safety.



The AQI tracks ozone (smog) and pollution (tiny particles from smoke, power plants and factories, vehicle exhaust, and other sources), as well as four other widespread air pollutants.

Newspapers, radio, television, and websites report AQI levels year-round. Keeping track of the current air quality information in your area can help you take steps to protect yourself, children and others from unhealthy levels of air pollution. Sensitive groups, such as those with asthma or lung disease, should limit time spent outdoors on high-pollution days. Learn more about AQI!

• West Nile and mosquito-borne illness prevention - As long as the weather is still warm, we need to be mindful of mosquito-carried diseases like West Nile. West Nile virus is transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. Although most people (8 in 10) who are infected do not feel sick, about 1 in 150 develop a serious, sometimes fatal, illness. People over age 60 are at greater risk for severe illness.

How to prevent mosquito bites:

- Use insect repellents. Repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, and some oil of lemon eucalyptus, as well as paramenthane-diol products, provide the best protection.
- o Limit outdoor activities at dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.
- Wear protective clothing (long pants, long-sleeved shirts, and socks) in areas where mosquitoes are active. Spray clothes with insect repellent for extra protection.







Beat the heat! Temperatures in Douglas County have been breaking records this year, but that hasn't stopped us from recreating at Rueter-Hess or attending the Fair & Rodeo! It's important to monitor the heat index and avoid a heat stroke.

The CDC and National Weather Service have developed a Heat Risk Tool that allows you to look up heat risk by ZIP code and categorizes heat risk in five groups: little to none, minor, moderate, major and

extreme. The tool also provides actions you can take to protect your health. Infants, children, older adults, and individuals with chronic medical conditions are at the highest risk for heat-related conditions including heat stroke and heat exhaustion. Buckle up for car seat safety - Starting with a baby's very first ride

home from the hospital, you want to make sure your kids travel safely. Using a child car or booster seat is the best protection you can give your child when traveling by car.

Three out of four parents think their children are in the right car seat, but they are not. Car Seats Colorado is dedicated to keeping kids ages 0-15 safe on Colorado roadways. Know for sure with these car seat recommendations. Get an inspection. Car Seats Colorado supports more than 140 inspection stations across the state. Inspection stations offer assistance for parents and caregivers, and inspectors can check to make sure your child's car seat is the right size and is installed properly. Find an inspection station near you. Learn about recalls. Check on current car seat and booster seat recalls.

Douglas County is one of the 11 partners in the Southern Shooting Partnership, which will prepare a recreational sport shooting strategy that provides safe, responsible and accessible recreational sport shooting opportunities while addressing conflicts near residential areas with other outdoor recreation users across the Front Range. For more information, visit our webpage.

• Partnership for Learning and Research - Staff worked with Open Space volunteers to organize a partnership study with Colorado State University (CSU) at Sandstone Ranch Open Space. On the evenings of July 9 through 11, Dr. Tanya Dewey, Professor at CSU led a class of students who conducted a small mammal survey, assisted by Colorado College Professor Maybellene Gamboa and an intern for their Organismal Biology and Ecology class. Livetrap transects of small mammals and netting of bats were performed along the west side of Sandstone Ranch. Project findings continue to be provided to Douglas County and reported to Colorado Parks and Wildlife. Twenty-five students participated in this study. The class has identified six different bat species, the most recent being Townsend's Big-Eared Bat that is considered a sensitive species in Colorado by the Bureau of Land Management. Partnerships like this help to provide insight to various species whose habitat includes Douglas County Open Space properties.





Human Services

• **Poverty Simulation** - Poverty or financial hardship is a reality for many individuals and families. But unless you've experienced this reality firsthand, it's difficult to truly understand. This interactive immersion experience bridges that gap from misconception to understanding. During the one-day simulation, participants will role-play a month in poverty and experience low-income families' challenges. After the simulation, you will unpack your learning and brainstorm community change. The goal of this experience is to shift the paradigm about poverty away from being seen as a personal failure and toward a better understanding of how poverty impacts our neighbors and community. The Department of Human Services is hosting four opportunities for our staff and our partner agencies to participate in a Poverty Simulation. The simulations were held on July 19th and August 15th.

The feedback receive thus far has been extremely positive ~ "it helped us see the chaos of families trying to decide what is the most important thing they need, and how sometimes those services are hard to get (application process)". "I enjoyed this exercise more than I anticipated. It was really great hands-on learning to show a small glimpse into how our families might feel at times". "It definitely helps to put things into perspective as it relates to the day-to-day issues/concerns that the families we serve have to navigate". "It was a very well executed training and I think it really helped highlight, respectfully, the stress that all of our "helping" systems can put on families".



Commissioner Work Sessions – July 29, 2024

- Tall Tales Ranch Update Representatives of Tall Tales Ranch and Douglas Housing Partnership participated in an update to the Board on recent funding granted to Tall Tales Ranch that will supplement the ARPA funding set aside for it in 2023 that will be coming back from the Wellspring repayment. The project financing and process was reviewed and the appropriate grant documents and ARPA agreement will be submitted to a future Business Meeting for execution.
- **Proposition 123 Intergovernmental Agreement** The Agreement was presented and reviewed by the Board that includes three projects identified to meet the commitments for affordable housing units over the next three years required under Proposition 123. The projects are located in Castle Pines, Castle Rock, Lone Tree, Parker and unincorporated Douglas County. The IGA will be submitted for approval at the August 13 Business Meeting.

- Oil & Gas Mineral Lease Proposal Staff briefed the Board on a request received from GMT Exploration Company to lease County-owned oil and gas beneath County-owned parcels in the northeastern portion of the County. GMT provided a standard lease and a lengthy discussion ensued about desired criteria to be included in the lease; including feedback from residents, infrastructure, traffic impacts, road improvements, statutory liability, air quality issues.
 - **Motion** Direct staff to engage in negotiations for this lease for the purposes of looking at a higher revenue recovery and then any offset to costs of use of the roads, and liability coverage. Passes 3-0.
- Douglas County Cultural Council Recommendations for 2024 SCFD Grant Funds The Board reviewed the recommendations from the Cultural Council on organizations to receive the 2024 SCFD funds and the scoring criteria used to make the recommendations. Commissioners Teal and Thomas agreed on the recommendations, as presented. Commissioner Laydon asked to see the scoring documents for each applicant and will be prepared to discuss the following week. The Certification of the recommendations is due August 9.
- Opioid Regional Council Update Staff gave the Board an update on the work of the Council, the members, RFQ to identify providers for various programs and the Council's decision to allocate funds to seven programs. First round of funding to organizations is \$1,128,890 of the \$3,957,211 in funds currently available to Region 12. Douglas County serves as the fiscal agent for Region 12 and the County is required to sign on the award and contracts that will be presented at the August 27 Business Meeting.
- Citizen Survey Discussion #2 The Board reviewed the survey questions they gave feedback on in the initial discussion. Additional discussion and revisions were discussed and an additional meeting is scheduled August 5th to review the revisions.

- **Kendrick Castillo Memorial Committee Update** The Commissioners were provided an update on the work of the Committee that included initiating a fundraising effort (to-date \$84,250.44 has been raised), work with the family to develop a memorial concept and initiate a street renaming. The Memorial at Civic Green Park is progressing in partnership with the HRMD and the scholarship fund established. What remains is the final decision on the street renaming and 4 scenarios with the costs involved were discussed. **Motion** Move forward with Option 1a as quickly as possible in support of the wishes of the family and our community. Passes 2-1. Commissioner Thomas opposed.
- Habitat Conservation Plan Statement of Responsibility Regarding an EA Commissioners were informed that the HCP is up for renewal. Brief history was presented. The Plan streamlines permitting on projects that impact identified Habitat. Next steps to effect the renewal was reviewed that includes filing a Statement of Responsibility Regarding an Environmental Assessment for NEPA review.

 Motion For the Board to support the Statement of Responsibilities as outlined for signature by the Chair. Passes 3-0.

Commissioner Work Sessions – August 5, 2024

- Citizen Survey Discussion #3 The Board reviewed the revised survey questions. A few additional revisions were made and next steps were discussed. The survey will be conducted the week of August 19th.
- Wildcat Regional Park Recreation Center A special work session was held to address the Wildcat Regional Park proposed feasibility study on a Recreational Sports Complex that was discussed at the recent Parks Board meeting and opposed by an overwhelming number of residents in the area. The Board also heard from HRCA about a proposal it had submitted for a passive park on the property. Public comments were taken that included concerns over the incompatible topography of the Wildcat property, disruption to the wildlife and quality of life, noise, traffic, waste of taxpayer money, suggested locating regional sports

facility elsewhere in the County that was more suitable. Commissioners debated about abandoning the feasibility study on Wildcat location permanently or suspending it until results of an upcoming citizen survey on parks and open space are reviewed before taking any additional action.

Motion #1 - Withdraw any action by the County or its staff on a feasibility study associated with this project until the survey results are in. Passes 3.0. Commissioner Teal made a motion to abandon the feasibility study permanently - Motion failed.
